Plan to build a monarch waystation this spring



Last month, a lengthy article was included pertaining to the plight of our Monarch Butterfly (refer to the website and read the April 2018 Garden Dirt

article in its entirety). Plan now for creating your own Monarch Waystation. Monarch Waystations are places that provide resources necessary for monarchs to produce successive generations and sustain their migration. Without milkweed throughout their spring and summer breeding areas in North America, monarchs would not be able to produce the successive generations that culminate in the migration each fall. Similarly, without nectar from flowers these fall migratory monarch butterflies would be unable to make their long journey to overwintering grounds in Mexico. The need for host plants for larvae and energy sources for adults applies to all monarch and butterfly populations around the world.

River Birch Nursery in Locust Grove has native Swamp Milkweed in stock in both pink and white varieties. The plants are healthy and ready for planting. Three Gallon containers cost \$8.99. "We visited River Birch nursery on Monday, April 23rd, and they had plenty in stock", reported Cathie Elliott.

The Value of Monarch Waystations

By creating and maintaining a Monarch Waystation you are contributing to monarch conservation, an effort that will help assure the preservation of the species and the continuation of the spectacular monarch migration phenomenon."
