The Frightened Frog, an NGC's President Project. Each week, the children were read to and taught about different aspects of an amphibian's life. August 15th marked the conclusion of this awardwinning program. Special thanks to Mary Ann McKay who prepared the lesson plan for each week, determined the craft project that would be done and coordinated all of the basic craft supplies and facilitated the program each week. Freda, the frightened frog (as portrayed by Jenny Boyenga) dressed in costume each week and assisted Mary Ann by reinforcing the storyline each week. A total of 15 RGC club members volunteered over the course of the seven week program. According to Mary Ann, "I want to thank all of those who helped each week to bring this program to these young children. This would not have been a success without the devotion that everyone put forth." Donna Anderson who is the Board President at the BGCNN was interviewed at the conclusion of this program. According to Donna, "This was the best program I've seen presented to the young children at the club. The children really responded to the multi-day, multi-media, multi-person workshop that engaged them in learning, playing and reinforcing the importance of what we do in our environment."
